

Research Poster Cheat Sheet

Basics and Layout

800 words or less
56" wide, 40" tall maximum
No less than 35% white space
Align your columns carefully
Put less important material at the bottom

Color

Avoid dark backgrounds
Pair strongly contrasting colors
Don't make color the only way to understand a visual aid -- use symbols as well
Screen color and print color are often different
It's much easier to design on top of white backgrounds

Art and Graphics

Design large and scale down if necessary
Never make an image larger or stretch it
300dpi is minimum resolution
Resist using images you find on random web sites
Use only images created by you or those with open licenses
Do not violate copyright law

Graphs and Charts

White background is best
Short, descriptive title
Label elements directly instead of using a key
Don't use grid lines
It's best to create your graphs in PowerPoint itself, or to import them from Excel
